


messages on the leaves.

Job Title: Court Operations Specialist-Senior / RCC-EDC Years Have You Worked For The Office: 5½ Years



The amount of visitors at court facilities

A ccording to Superior Court, they are reporting in their Annual Report that last fiscal year the Court Centers had the following amount of visitors:

- Downtown 552,685 visitors
- Northeast 136,875 visitors
- Northwest 101,671 visitors
- Other Court Facilities 269,287



The Clerk's Office has offices within these facilities and so many of these customers were most likely Clerk of the Court customers. Southeast was most likely grouped in with "Other Facilities."
